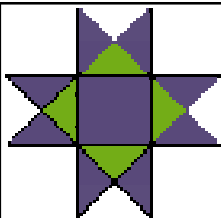

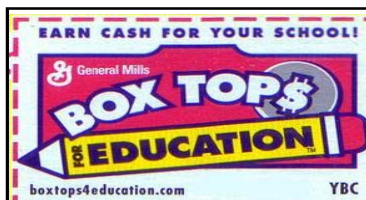

Summer is starting! The children will be outside playing every-day. Please be aware of the necessity of keeping our children safe in our community and the world today.

The Helping Hand Safety Program is an active safety program in Merchantville. There are currently almost 20 safe houses throughout the community. All school children are aware of the program through program education in Merchantville and St. Peter's schools. This education is done each year for new students and to remind the younger students of its importance and purpose.

The Helping Hand Safety Program is always looking for new safe houses. Please take a moment and think if you or any of your friends, neighbors and/or retirees that you know in town, would fit the criteria for participation in our program. The key criteria would be:

1. to be home during the day
2. to complete the application and the Police background check

Please remember, this is a volunteer based program. There are no meetings, or other time requirements. A Helping Hand sign is placed in your home window or door and if necessary, you will call 911 if a child comes to your home for help. Towne Centre East Redevelopment Plan

The borough Planning Board met on 6/20 to hear an application by AST Development Corp. for the area known as the Merchantville triangle or Towne Centre East. The meeting presented the board, community and business owners with an overview of the architectural components and engineering design aspects of the site plan for the proposed redevelopment. Official minutes of the meeting will be available at Borough Hall as soon as adopted. The Planning Board will meet again on 6/27 at the Community Center for a second hearing. **Some aspects of the design plan include:**

Site 1 - the triangular lot behind Centre Street running along Chestnut Avenue and Park Avenue to a point at Gilmore Avenue. The **proposal** for Site 1 involves an infill plan utilizing the principles of Smart Growth with a mix of residential, retail and parking. The plans call for twenty-six 1,500-2,200 square foot residential units on each of three floors. Retail space on the ground level will be leased and residential units, which are condominiums, will be offered at market price somewhere between the high 200's and low 400's depending on unit size and amenities. The parking plan includes 124 ground level and 181 below grade parking stalls. Parking provides every condominium with two assigned spaces. Additionally, Site 1 includes two infill buildings along Centre Street, on either side of PNC Bank, which will have one 2,000 square foot unit on each 2nd and 3rd floor. The retail space will model the residential units in size.

Site 2 - refers to the area known as the Verizon lot on Park Avenue. The **proposal** for Site 2 includes a mix of residential and parking and will have a total of 17 units on three floors in one building.

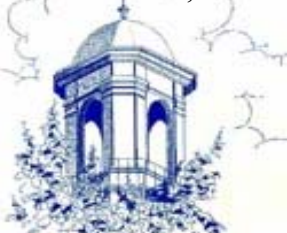

Farewell to Bonnie Boyle, Harris Ransom, and Lee Whitaker

Longtime Merchantville School teachers, Bonnie Boyle and Lee Whitaker, retired at the end of the school year and school principal, Harris Ransom, is leaving due to budget cuts. Mrs. Boyle and Mr. Whitaker, who together have over 50 years of teaching experience, had their final day at Merchantville School on June 20th. Mrs. Boyle taught basic skills and Jr. High language arts, and was the moderator for many programs and activities including the National Jr. Honor Society, peer mediation, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, and the Merchantville Drug Alliance. Mr. Whitaker was a special education teacher at Merchantville and the Safety Patrol coordinator. Mr. Whitaker, who is also known for providing musical accompaniment for Santa Clause on his December 23rd stroll, has released a CD of original songs which was a hit last summer in the Netherlands and he plans to explore a second career in music.

Mr. Ransom leaves Merchantville School at the end of June after 17 years as our school principal. Students, staff, and the PTA honored Mr. Ransom during a special tribute assembly on June 14th. The Merchantville School Community will fondly remember him and he is wished much success in his future endeavors.

School Board Election Results

At the April 18th election the school budget was defeated by 28 votes. As a result, Borough Council, after reviewing the school's budget proposal and discussions with the Board, voted to reduce the school budget by \$13,000 effectively holding the budget at last year's level.

The April 18th voters also elected Sharon Hartson Stine, Elliot Honigfeld, and Andrew Velten to three-year terms on the Board and Steven Volkert and Lorri Zeiders to one-year terms. At the Board's April 25th reorganization meeting Sharon Hartson Stine was elected Board President and Edward Bohn was elected Vice-President.

Subsequent to the reorganization meeting Mrs. Stine made the following committee chair appointments: Buildings & Grounds – Terry Doran; Carroll Will – Ed Bohn; Community Relations – Steve Volkert; Curriculum & Technology – Ed Bohn; Discipline – Steve Marrone; Finance – Henry Kabel; High School – Henry Kabel; Personnel – Ed Bohn; Planning – Drew Velten; Policy – Lorri Zeiders.

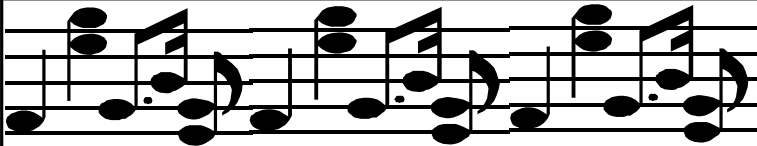

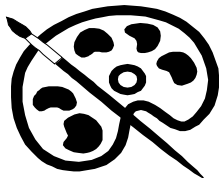
